

**Announcement of
JUDICIAL VACANCY
Extended
September 28th, 2016**

Applications are now being accepted for the position of justice court judge in Rich County. This position results from the retirement of Judge Ross McKinnon effective January 1st, 2017.

Completed application forms must be received by the Administrative Office of the Courts no later than 5:00 p.m., on Wednesday, October 12th, 2016.

Work of the Court

Justice courts are established by counties and municipalities and have the authority to hear class B and C misdemeanors, small claims, and infractions committed within their territorial jurisdiction.

Selection Process

Utah law requires the Judicial Nominating Commission to submit three to five nominees to the Rich County Commission within 45 days of its first meeting. The local government executive has 30 days in which to make a selection. The selection must be certified by the Utah Judicial Council. At its first meeting the Nominating Commission reviews written public comments. This meeting is open to the public. To comment upon issues of local concern, general qualities of justice court judges, or other constructive recommendations, submit a written statement no later than September 27th, 2016 to the Administrative Office of the Courts, Attention: Melisse Stiglich Re: Rich County Nominating Commission

Terms of Employment

A. Requirements/Benefits

Minimum Requirements: Under Section 78A-7-201 of the Utah Code, Justice Court judges must be at least 25 years old.

Residency: All judges must be United States citizens. Justice Court judges must be Utah residents for at least three years immediately preceding selection. Justice Court judges must also be a resident of the county in which the court is located or an adjacent county for at least six months immediately preceding appointment and be a qualified voter of the county in which the judge resides.

Education Requirements: In counties of the third, fourth, fifth and sixth class, a Justice Court judge shall have at the minimum a high school diploma or GED.

Annual Salary: This position offers a salary range of \$8,000.00 to \$12,000.00. Some benefits provided; information may be obtained from the local hiring authority by calling Becky Peart at (435)793-2415.

B. Judicial Retention

Each judge is subject to an unopposed, nonpartisan retention election at the first general election held more than three years after the appointment. To be retained, the judge must receive a majority of affirmative votes cast.

Following the first retention election, justice court judges appear on the retention ballot every six years.

C. Performance Evaluation

All sitting judges undergo a performance review after the first year in office and biennially thereafter. Judges not up for retention election can use the performance review results as a guide for self-improvement. Judges up for retention election are subject to Certification Review by the Judicial Performance Evaluation Commission. Prior to the election, the Commission publishes in the voter information pamphlet whether the judge met or failed to meet the following evaluation criteria:

- Compliance with case delay reduction standards
- No public sanctions by the Judicial Conduct Commission during the term of office and not more than one private sanction during the final two years of the term of office
- Completion of 30 hours of approved judicial education each year
- Self Certification that the judge is physically and mentally able to serve, and complies with the Code of Judicial Conduct and Administration
- A satisfactory score on the certification portion of the Commission's Survey of the Bar
- For District and Justice Court Judges a satisfactory score on the certification portion of the Commission's Survey of jurors
